In Memoriam

From Ian Alexander - re: Douglas Alexander 24/08/1919

I regret to inform you that my father, one of your really old boys, died last Monday, 20th Jan at the Lister in Stevenage. He commuted to the school by train from WGC, from the age of 7, 1926 and left in 1937 – went to the Northern Polytechnic and did Architecture – interrupted by Mr Hitler and so qualified in 1950. Until a few years ago, he used to come to Old Boys Day, a firm fixture in his diary, but failing health stopped him. At 94, I think he had a decent innings!

John Neville

John Edwin Neville attended Hitchin Grammar School from 1948 to 1955 and left at the age of 18 years. He was immediately called up and joined the Royal Army Ordinance Corps where he did a clerical course. He went to St Mark and St John Teacher Training College in 1957 and after finishing the course in 1960, became a science teacher at Hertford Grammar School. That same year he started a part-time degree at Regent Street Polytechnic graduating in 1965. By this time he had been married for 6 years. In 1966 he moved into tertiary education by obtaining a lectureship in Marine Biology at Barking Regional College of Technology (later to become the University of East London). He and his wife moved to Upminster and the following year Victoria was born and three years later, William was born. In 1970 John embarked on a part-time MSc Course in Environmental Pollution Science at Brunel University gaining his MSc in 1974. In 1978, tragically his wife died. John continued his career eventually becoming Professor and Dean of Faculty of Science and Health at the University of East London. He married again in 1980.

John was always open to new ideas and was prepared to foster opportunities for staff and students. He was an excellent facilitator and a well respected role model and colleague. He retired in 1997 and devoted much of his time to family and the local community. He became involved with the Upminster and District Horticultural Society, the local United Reformed Church and the local New Windmill Hall Community Association. He learnt Italian for many years organising a self help group; he loved gardening, theatre, music, travel (particularly to Italy), wine, entertaining and DIY. He died at home after a short illness on the 19th October 2013 and is survived by his second wife, daughter, son and grandson.

This is a eulogy from Andrew Parr:-

Iris Spark began work at Hitchin Boys' Grammar School in 1962. Those whose association with the School goes back that far may be able to confirm that she began as an assistant secretary, with Mavis Stannard her superior, but became in due course the Headmaster's personal secretary and finally the Bursar, roles which she fulfilled with the utmost conscientiousness and probity.

I first met her when I began teaching at the School in 1971. From the first day of my service until she left in 1996, she was almost unfailingly cheerful, and always kind and supportive. Diminutive in stature, she was anything but in personality and character. She had a very highly developed sense of duty, never cutting corners, always doing what she felt to be the right thing. She took a real interest in those around her, whether colleagues or pupils. She never hid behind her typewriter but was ready to give advice, sympathy and understanding whenever it was needed. She had a sense of fun and enjoyed the humorous moments when teachers such as John Gardiner or Reg Williams would appear in the office. She often found the antics of the boys equally amusing even when they had not intended them to be so.

Iris was extremely loyal and would seldom if ever be heard to criticize a member of staff and absolutely never the Headmaster. She was extremely flexible and forgiving when teachers got behind with paperwork or financial matters, even though such things made her life more difficult.

She loved school events, plays, concerts, social functions and the like. Such simple things brought her real excitement which radiated from her face as if she were attending a garden party at the Palace.

Her memory for names and faces was astonishing. It would not surprise me to learn that she could name virtually every boy and every teacher who had passed through the School in her time there. Very often, she would report seeing a former pupil (whom she would name) in town after a long absence or would recognize and warmly greet an Old Boy who had returned to visit the School decades after leaving it and emigrating, perhaps, to Australia or Canada.

She continued to enquire of colleagues about their children long after they had grown up and left home and took real pleasure in hearing news of them.

It was typical of her that she had little sense of her importance to the School and the extent to which it relied on her for the smooth running of its administration as well as for an appreciable portion of its pastoral care of the boys. I have no hesitation in saying that Iris was, in many respects, the heart of the School and contributed greatly to the family feeling which we tried to foster within it. She was, for many years, its chief administrator and the enduring comradely spirit of that section of the School today is, in part, her legacy. For teachers, to walk into the office with its smiles and its friendliness, then as now, was often a moment of respite from the pressures outside and this former teacher, at least, will forever be grateful for such moments and for the example Iris set in creating that atmosphere.

Those who continued to encounter Iris in town from time to time in the years following her retirement will have been delighted to see this little figure walking as briskly and purposefully as ever on many occasions and ready for a chat. In her latter years she devoted much time to caring for her dear husband, Dave, whose health was failing, but former members of the Senior Leadership Team much enjoyed taking her out to lunch in 2012 and finding her spirit and her curiosity for "school news" undiminished.

To know that she is no longer with us is a source of considerable sadness but hers was a life well-lived. She tended to keep family matters mostly to herself but we knew enough to affirm that she was a wonderful wife and mother. How could such a delightful and exemplary colleague be otherwise? Rest in peace, dear Iris, with our gratitude and love.

Bryan Sydney Barker

Bryan died suddenly, on Saturday 11th January 2014, the day before his 76th birthday. His funeral took place on Friday 24th January at 1pm at St Peter's Church, Caversham, followed by a reception in his memory for his family and many friends at Caversham Heath Golf Club, Mapledurham.

There were number of responses from his peer group, all saying good things about Bryan. I remember him as a wonderful fast bowler for Hitchin at the same time as Alan Hazelwood. Dickie Crabbe also remembered him. Eugene Gavin sent in his thoughts which, I felt were very apt :-

I suppose one is always disturbed by the death of someone familiar to you. Selfishly, I suppose, it makes you aware of the possibility of your own mortality. With Bryan it is a bit different. He was a couple of years older than me and in the form above. He was also a rather shy person. He had nothing to be shy about. He was a magnificent cricketer. I played in school teams with him and I thought him awesome. He was a big lad but had a natural athletic grace. Apart from his ability as a fast bowler, it was his performance in the slips that had me gaping. His speed of reaction was such that he caught balls flying towards him as if he were plucking plums. That such a gentle and gifted man has died is deeply shocking to me.

Bryan Sydney Barker died suddenly on 11th January this year, on the eve of his 76th birthday and 51st wedding anniversary. Bryan, who spent his childhood in Letchworth, completed his secondary school education at Hitchin Boys Grammar in 1955, from which he went up to St Catherine's College, Oxford, to read Electrical Engineering. He worked throughout his life in the electronics and computing fields, taking on increasingly managerial and corporate roles, travelling widely in Europe, the Middle East and the United States, and spending many years living and working in Belgium, enabling him to put his language skills in German and especially French to good use. Bryan enjoyed and often spoke of his years spent at Hitchin, where he made several lifelong friends and in the sixth form, during ballroom dancing classes, met his wife Daphne Cole who attended Hitchin Girls. Bryan was an enthusiastic member of the scout group at school and fondly reminisced about camping and climbing trips in Wales and in Switzerland, travelling in the back of a furniture van, and making gallons of porridge over the camp fire. Skills and knowledge acquired in the scouts stood him in good stead in later years – he was the family's purveyor of breakfast porridge and retraced his schoolboy steps over and up many a Swiss mountain on later family holidays. Bryan was a keen sportsman at school and many remember him for his skills in football but also on the cricket pitch – both as a fast bowler and also for his speed and accuracy of fielding in the slips. Friends of Bryan's made at all stages of his life, whether from school and university days, colleagues, employees, neighbours, golfing partners in retirement – all speak of a kind, gentle, funny, gifted and clever man, very much loved and appreciated. Bryan is survived by his wife, his two daughters and two grandsons – who shared a very special, close and loving family life with him.

Martin Brown gave his report to the Old Boys. He said it was great that things keep happening year on year. The school was now an Academy which is a funding mechanism for running the school but it still does all that it did before. Last year we were in the top 100 most improved schools and this year we are in the top 100 highest performing schools (non- selective). It was a matter of everyone pulling together and long may it continue. MB reported on the performance of the school in the areas of Music and Sport. This is explained more fully in the next Bulletin.

The Pavilion is now safe but it will need a large amount of work to complete the project. It is hoped to be ready for the Summer.

The size of the school is still growing, with 165 in the first form (Year 7) next year. There are still 81 on the waiting list. NHDC want us to expand, so there are delicate negotiations continuing.
