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## School Scout Troop

**50** years ago in 1965 at Easter the School Scouts went to Germany for a walking holiday along the Rhine Gorge. It almost ended in tragedy as we suffered carbon monoxide poisoning at a Youth Hostel, in Bacharach, see attached news item.

My memory of the event was that the main building was occupied by a large party from a Manchester school and we were put in the annex, a tower. It had turned cold and the supplementary heating was put on and due to a cracked inspection plate fumes seeped into our dormitory. I was fortunate to have an upper bunk near the door. During the night I had extremely persistent pins and needles and awoke with a terrible headache. I was the first down to the washrooms. Already washing were members of a French cycling club. I made it to a basin and grimly hung on. Another of our party followed me in and nearly collapsed. The French cyclists first reaction was that we must be badly hung over. Then realising something was badly wrong the alarm was raised. We all trooped out into the courtyard and gathered in little groups. One scout would faint and the whole of that group went down in sympathy. I and one other remained standing and everyone else was taken to hospital for a check up. While they were away, I rediscovered my appetite and had a hearty breakfast. Two members of the party, the youngest and an asthma sufferer, were kept in for observation. The rest returned with orders to only eat a light breakfast if they could manage it. That evening, Stan Rainbow asked if any of us had written home, in those days of limited communications even telephoning was unusual, and to avoid a parent panic he sent the official report back, on which the Herts Express published the attached.

We finished our holiday at Bingen, where at a reception we each received a quarter bottle of German brandy. None of the Scouts was over 18 years old and on the (Cont. on Page 2)

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## Air Training Corp.

A gentleman named Adrian Jones, who is the CO of the ATC unit in Bedford Road, Hitchin contacted me regarding the ATC's foundation which was in 1941 and, he thought it was at the School. I asked if any of you had any memories etc., and the replies are below:

**From Rodney Thomas (1962)**

I joined the ATC whilst at school. 1066 Squadron - easy to remember! I am pretty sure Dinger Webb was CO at the time. The base was in Whinbush Road. We went for a week to RAF Swinderby one year. Whilst there one of the aircraft overshot the runway and the pilot ended up in hospital. We went on the firing range and used the Enfield 303, Wow did that give you a heavy kick in the shoulder! I did rather well.

**From John Mayhead**

I was in the Sept 1942 intake at school and well remember the ATC being there. They met in the old Art Room which they took over, somewhat to TE's chagrin. Grammar School Boys were not given permission to join by TE. The Cadets only had access from Bancroft and I think that there were too many of them to all meet in one group and I think that they met Tues and Thurs. Or was one night ATC and the other Army Cadets? My memory fails me, it was not of significance to me. There was no school involvement at all. The School Scout Group was affected as they could no longer use the old Art Room until the Cadets had their own premises. The Cadet Corps were very popular in the town during the war and there is no doubt that they fulfilled a useful purpose as non Grammar School pupils left school end of term on attaining the age of 14yrs. Grammar School Boys did not leave until after they attained at least 16 years. We were encouraged to join the school scout group and the Cadet Groups were prohibited from recruiting from the Scouts and as TE would not grant permission to join them anyway, they were "off limits"! That partly explains attitudes to Grammar School pupils at that time, we were considered to be toffee nosed elite and consequently could be "beaten up" if you ventured in to the wrong areas of the town, such as parts of West Mill and Sunnyside as I learned to my cost. These were areas that the inhabitants of the slums on what became St Mary's Square were rehoused to in the 1930s. I never ventured in to Sunnyside Road until I was on Christmas Postal Duty in 1947, with a GPO Armband on my arm they could only "catcall" me. I remember that well!

**From David Lee**

A bit too young. I was in the ATC squadron from 1975 to 1980 ish. (I was certainly still in in 1980 as I attended camp at RAF Gibraltar). If he wants contact /photos from that era I may be able to help.

**From Kit Burdess**

When I was a cadet there it was not at the school, it was in the town, though Mr Webb, Chemistry teacher, was CO at least during the period 1956-60. The base of '1066 sqn' was then in Whinbush Road and there were I think rather few Hitchin Boys' Grammar School boys in it. I remember it well - learned to glide (at Henlow) and got a Flying Scholarship where I learned to fly on a Tiger Moth biplane at Luton Airport in 1960.

**From Eric Foster**

I joined 1066 squadron of the ATC in late 1943 or early 1944 and have a number of items among my memorabilia relating to that time. I don't know whether they would be of any interest with respect to their requirements for the celebration or when they would be required, if at all. The photographs are unfortunately only small - typically Kodak Brownie of that age, 70 years ago. It was November 1945, after the end of the war, before I was eventually called to service. No more aircrew were required and, despite all my training, I ended up as a humble Clerk General Duties. If I remember correctly, both F J Webb (chemistry master) and E F Whitworth (physics master) were officers of the squadron. The CO, who was rarely seen except on ceremonial occasions, went by the name of Mainwaring (shades of Dad's Army ?)

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## News from Members

**Philip Slater (Lewes w. Sussex)**

Are you still up and running as an organisation? I was at HBGS in the late 50's until leaving in 1966. I was writing to a relative about the appalling standards of discipline in modern schools and was about to say that the headmaster Mr Dolden wouldn't have tolerated it, but I wasn't sure how his name was spelt. So Googled "HBGS" and found your site and the correct spelling of Dolden. Sad to see the names of fellow classmates who have died. I was in the same class as Gavin Bowyer for example, plus teachers like "Nell" Gwynne. I was in the same year as Bernie Cotton and David Whitaker who achieved hockey fame. I went off to the very new University of East Anglia, did chemistry which was never as interesting as with "Dinger" Webb, and eventually did a PhD in Oceanography. I then spent 25-years in the water business looking after water quality and the infrastructure. I enjoyed the house system, the traditions, the friends, three card brag and shove halfpenny on the benches of the gallery above the assembly hall. Never bored.

Hockey was something I really enjoyed of all the sporting seasons, and the school always had close links with the Blueharts club. My father, Cyril Slater, played at Hitchin Cricket Club for many years as a bowler and the Blueharts pitch was behind the cricket pavilion. He played with people like Geoff Grant and somewhere I have a photo of them altogether. HBGS really shaped me, taught me respect, toughness (cold bath swimming at Butts Close, the annual cross country run, stone picking etc.). I despair when I see some of the behaviour now and wonder where it all went wrong. The sporting side of HBGS was uppermost, coupled with Mattocke, Pierson, Radcliffe or Skynner, which sometimes led to us not so sporty ones feeling a bit left out. The crowning event was the swimming contest and Victor Ludorum and all that. I always regret the division at an early age of science and arts and in particular the restriction of not being able to enter A-level biology if you took Chemistry and Physics. I always wanted to enter the medical profession, but (Cont. on Page 3)

(Cont. from Page 2) the lack of biology put paid to that. To put matters right, I took biology A level as a mature student and got an A grade. 1961 must have been an altogether different experience. I recently met a lady neighbour called Deidre who was a border at the Girls School up Windmill Hill (not in my time I'm afraid). My cousin Judith was head girl at HGGs and went on to teach English in Southall. As a PS, I am well retired now, active cyclist, keen environmentalist, designs on sustainable self-build, self-learning microcontroller programming with a view to home automation, so thanks to Fred? Ernie? Whitmore and Ohm's Law. Nice to see that the school had such an influence on all involved and there is such a thriving association.

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# In Memoriam

*ED: There are some late ones from last year, missed in the November Bulletin, apologies*

**Derek Hillman** passed away on 18<sup>th</sup> February 2014 aged 85 paratrooper and ICI WG.

I am sorry to report that **Dr Maurice George Philpott** (HBGS 1928 - 1937) died on 7<sup>th</sup> February 2014, aged 94 years. This followed the death of his dear friend of 90 years, Douglas Alexander on 20<sup>th</sup> January. I believe that Douglas' son, Ian, has already informed you of his father's passing.

The two gentlemen were born four weeks apart, and died three weeks apart -- quite extraordinary. They had been in touch with each other until a few weeks before their deaths.

I know that there had been a little article about them in a recent Old Boys' Gazette, and perhaps you would mention the passing of these two remarkable Old Boys. If you wish to have any more information, please let me know.

We have spoken briefly but I would now confirm that sadly, my dad, Douglas Alexander, passed away on 20<sup>th</sup> January, at the ripe old age of 94. He always held his School in very high regard, especially when compared to his Prep School in WGC where the sadistic Head and his son regularly caned the whole school - all 25 of them! You may also have heard that another of your Old Boys has recently died, Maurice Philpott, on 7<sup>th</sup> February - no doubt Nick his son will be in contact.

### **Peter Downey**

*From David Stancombe.* It was with great sadness that I learned Peter had died last year when I phoned to make arrangements for our contemporaries to meet up at the April reunion. I spoke with his wife Jennifer and she has written something of his life and work in Sheffield.

We first met at Wilshere Dacre Primary School and living in the same area of Hitchin often met up on our walk along the alley ways to school. These walks continued during our time at HBGS, although our return journeys did not coincide as we tended to have different after-school interest. I asked David Walker to refresh his memory from the school magazine and he found most of the school activities that Peter was involved in. He was a keen thespian and appeared in the most of Thomas/Tromans Shakespeare productions taking roles such as Fleance in Macbeth, Demetrius in Midsummer Nights Dream and Sir Andrew Aguecheek in Twelfth Night. He was a member of the School Orchestra where he worked his way from the Second to First Violins. In his last year at school, unusually, he was placed both in Athletics (100 yds and 220 yds) and in Swimming (50 m freestyle). He also obtained played in the School Second XI hockey team and gained his House Colours for Hockey.

After gaining the proverbial 10 'O' Levels we went along different routes in the sixth form where he followed his main interest of Geography for which subject he was awarded a Sixth Form Prize In Geography. He was a member of the School Scout Troop so would have learned the basics of backwoods craft from SGR.

He was never lacking in enthusiasm, and when he last attended the Old Boys Dinner he still full of enthusiasm for his administrative responsibilities - at Sheffield University.

### **Lister Wilson**

It is with great regret that I have to inform you that Lister Wilson a former Master at the school died in January this year. He had been ill for some time and lately his health had deteriorated rapidly. This news was given to me by his son Tim Wilson, who was also at the school and I am sure numbers of you will remember both of them.

### **Peter J Thomas (1943)**

I am sad to tell you that Peter Thomas died in January 2015, just five months after his dear wife Pat.

I remember him both from the Blueharts and the Old Boys. Such a terrific person, a sense of purpose and a sense of fun, whilst always focussed on getting things done. I was there, as a lad, humping bricks and tiles for my Father, Mr Dolden and Peter, during the building of the Old Boys' Pavilion. It was Peter who started the Blueharts Bonfire Party many years ago when he, Roger Hawkins and Barry Cook used the Car Park at Blueharts for their little bonfire party for their children, as it was Peter's Birthday.

When the Colts side was formed Peter was one of the older members, who drove us round and it was so good to have someone like him to watch and learn from. His funeral is at Harwood Park Crematorium on February 24<sup>th</sup> at 12.30pm I have had several memories from Old Boys and I have put them onto the front page of the web site, together with some pictures from Pat Russell's archives, via his son Shaun.
